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The Syracuse City School District Educational Foundation is an independent fundraising organization charged with providing supplemental resources for educational programs in our Syracuse City Schools. Founded during the 2003 school year, the SCSD Educational Foundation is a 501(c)(3) corporation overseen by an active and working Board of Directors. Board members include representatives of local corporations, school district administrators, government officials, parents, and two district high school students.

The Foundation has successfully provided over **\$875,000** in education grants for projects that otherwise would not have been possible. We have purchased a wide array of educational resources including technology such as iPads, computers and SMART Boards, classroom programming aides, books, tutorial programs, supplies, instructional software programs, equipment, and the components necessary for presentations and classroom initiatives.

The Foundation has actively supported STEM (Science, Technology, Engineering and Math) programs, environmental responsibility (green projects), literacy, and living and learning through arts education. The success that the SCSD Educational Foundation has achieved has been made possible with the generous support and donations from major corporations, local businesses and individuals, SCSD alumni, and from individual United Way contributions or donations provided by school district employees and administrators.

The SCSD Educational Foundation hosts two fundraising events each year. In the spring, the Foundation has its Annual Recognition Breakfast and presents awards to companies and individuals who have gone above and beyond to support the students in Syracuse City Schools. At the breakfast the Foundation also presents Educator of the Year awards to noteworthy SCSD teachers, staff, and administrators. 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
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Congratulations 2020 Educators of the Year

Each year, the SCSD Educational Foundation, together with the Syracuse City School District, is proud to recognize the men and women who help to ensure educational excellence in Syracuse City Schools. To be eligible, an Educator of the Year candidate must be a full-time District employee. Key factors considered in this nomination process are the unique abilities that make these individuals outstanding among his or her peers. Winners of these awards are teachers, administrators, or support staff who demonstrate a willingness to go **“above and beyond”** and who provide support to students in an exceptional manner. Nominations are submitted each year by peers, students, parents, community organizations, businesses, colleagues, and District administrators.



Robert Leslie
Director, Career and Technical Education

Thanks to Robert Leslie, SCSD Director of Career and Technical Education (CTE) programs, Syracuse City School District students now have the option to enter an impressive 27 different CTE programs as they begin high school, setting them up for success in both college and career. Bob Leslie was nominated for this award by district administrators, college partners and community business groups. All three recognize the impact that Mr. Leslie’s expansion of the district’s CTE programs have had not just on Syracuse City School District students, but also on the greater Syracuse community as a whole. Since 2014, Bob has led the expansion of career and technical education pathways from just 7 to 27. These programs have helped lead students to experience lower rates of absence,

higher GPAs, higher Regents passing rates and higher graduation rates. They have also helped provide students with the mentoring, job training and work experience to set them ahead no matter what path they choose to follow after completing high school. Mr. Leslie has created strong partnerships with local educational institutions, local businesses and more, all while navigating the complexities of state and federal regulations pertaining to these programs. His leadership in the field of Career and Technical Education has made the SCSD a leader in CTE programs.


Kyle Voyer

Clary Middle School Special Education teacher Kyle Voyer was nominated by not one, not two, but three parents. All three spoke of Mr. Voyer’s above and beyond commitment to their children. Mr. Voyer has gone out of his way to keep the lines of communication open with the families of his students. He sets clear goals for his students to achieve and works with families to ensure that his students have the support necessary to achieve them. Rachel Murphy joined the Syracuse City School District in 2016 as Director of Food and Nutrition Services. Over the course of the past four years, Ms. Murphy has partnered with students, staff and community agencies to improve our existing food and nutrition programs, implement successful new programs and plan for future programs. In 2018, Ms. Murphy created a Student Menu Committee, where high school students from throughout the district came together to provide their thoughts and feedback regarding the district's meals. She provided students with the opportunity to help develop new meal options that have since been entered into the SCSD menu rotation. In 2019, Ms. Murphy led the effort to start Sharing Tables at schools across the district, to help reduce food waste and provide an added support for students facing food uncertainty. Our students are lucky to have a leader so passionate about hearing and reacting to their feedback!

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

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2020 Recognition Award Bankers Healthcare Group

The following year, when Diane Vitello had just started as Principal at Dr. Weeks, she was told that BHG would visit in December and bring every one of her 800 students a gift to take home over the holidays. It seemed too good to be true! As it turns out, it wasn't an adequate representation of the generosity BHG would ultimately show toward the Dr. Weeks families.



The first time Diane was able to meet the employees in their identical blue shirts, she immediately understood that this company had an incredible level of dedication to the Syracuse community. They also showed up with boxes and boxes of toys for the smiling excited children! They inquired about doing more.



Diane explained how food insecurity affected many of the school's families over long breaks from school. Within

hours, bags and bags of food were brought into Dr. Weeks to send home with families. Then BHG set up their next visit to equip the students with summer games to increase physical activity and outside play time over the summer break. And the generosity and commitment to the families and children at Dr. Weeks has continued.

Amanda Murphy is a parent, a building substitute teacher, and a volunteer at Salem-Hyde Elementary School.

She was nominated by Salem-Hyde Principal Rebecca Groat, and a parent...Tanya Eastman, whose daughter was a student at Salem- Hyde.

Amanda has provided long-standing support to the students, families, staff, and administration of the Syracuse City School District for almost a decade since her eldest daughter, who recently graduated from Henninger High School, began her academic journey at Salem-Hyde many years ago.

She started decorating bulletin boards for the school one summer and ended up decorating nearly every bulletin board in the school.

She offered ideas, a creative and positive vision for the school, and the energy and work ethic to put behind those ideas. She volunteers to help run school events both during the day and outside the school day.

She also enlists the help of her family, her husband and children and her mother, all who share that same servant's heart and passion that she possesses.

She has an annual Valentine's Day Tea party where students get "dressed-up" and learn about etiquette, have tea and cookies (all donated through her hard work and fundraising), and go home with a special tea cup to commemorate the experience. She works with several of the grades to provide "wish list" activities ranging from crafts to grade wide projects directly tied to curriculum.



Amanda solicits donations for the Salem-Hyde clothing closet and single-handedly gets donations throughout the year for Halloween Parade, Thanksgiving and Christmas. She collected dozens of costumes for students so they would all be dressed for Halloween and given out coats to almost 50 students during the winter. She also organizes a Holiday Fair that has local crafters come in to sell affordable Christmas gifts students can purchase for their families. She has collected over \$6,000 worth of donations for our families for Christmas. She has purchased, organized, and wrapped presents for 120 children. She even weeds the gardens in front of the school!

She is a true **giving** "rock star", also known as a selfless servant who is called to give and does so abundantly. For that reason, the SCSD Educational Foundation is proud to present Amanda Murphy with its 2020 Recognition Award.

Spreading a Positive Message

Teacher: Lisa Lambert

School: Expeditionary Learning Middle School

The 7th grade students at Expeditionary Learning Middle School (ELMS) are learning to spread a positive message of change in our community. Students will meet with local individuals who not only inspire change but put in the time to make it happen in Syracuse. We call these special individuals "Agents of Change." Our students will work alongside these agents of change in service-learning projects that create positive change here in Syracuse. Our students will grow from learning about agents of change, spreading the message and contributing to already existing "quests for change," to our students becoming agents of change themselves. Students will set out to create a campaign that brings an awareness to the community about stepping up and becoming an "Agent of Change" within the City of Syracuse. Students will explore different ways to market their campaign through conventional media, promotional items, and digital media outlets of video and website design. With the support of the Educational Foundation the students can create a more authentic campaign and products. This project brings together the humanities, arts and technology to inspire students to see that they can do more than they think they can.

Paint Knight Meets the Middle (*Paint Knight Gives Back*)

Teacher: Lori Lizzio

School: Henninger High School

Sharing the experience of making art with our community is the continuing goal of Paint Knight. My high school art students will create art with 8th grade art students from our feeder schools. The middle school students will bring a parent to also paint, so the parents can connect to a subject and skill that means something to their child. This experience will help the middle school students make a connection to Henninger and the art students at Henninger, as well as provide an opportunity to for my high school students to teach, model and lead the experience.

Marilyn Jones Life and Learning Through Arts Grant

Bringing Fine Arts to Life

Teacher: Joseph Foster

School: Salem Hyde Elementary School

Fifth grade students will research famous art works and/or artists of their choosing. After researching the students will work to create a ceramic tile mural for installation in the school. This project will allow students to do an in-depth



study of art and artists. Our 5th grade has a yearly scheduled field trip to the Everson Museum and this project will allow students to have a choice to incorporate artwork from the Everson into their tiles. This project will help build an awareness of the importance of art in our community. Students will have an opportunity to make a real-life connection between art and our community.





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2019-2020 Grant Projects

Stonework Play

Teacher: Kristin Lisi

School: Montessori at Lemoyne Elementary

The teacher explains to the students they will be using stones to create a design to tell a story. The teacher then encourages students to be thoughtful in their stone selection and design they create. Examples will be shown. Children will select a bucket full of stones to create their design. Then students will begin working in silence. Once the student is finished, they will use a clipboard, paper and pencil to draw a sketch of their creation. Working with an adult, the student will tell their story and the teacher will write it in the exact words given. Student will share their drawing, narration and stone design to the class.

Work Based Learning - The Greenhouse Project

Teacher: Patrick Gillette

School: PSLA@Fowler

The work-based learning program at PSLA provides our students with the opportunity to apply classroom knowledge practical applications. Students will gain practical job skills by working in our greenhouse at PSLA. Students will be assigned tasks to perform in the greenhouse and work on employing ability skills. The employed ability skills include being on time, following directions, working well with peers and task completion. The students will be monitored and mentored daily for progress on these skills. One of the equipment requests we are making is for a grow light for the greenhouse. The grow light will need to be hard-wired in the greenhouse. Mr. Wilson's electrical trades class will install this light in the greenhouse. This provides Mr. Wilson's Career and Educational students the opportunity to practice skills learned in class on an actual real-life applications.

Inclusive Teaching with a Montessori Mind Frame

Teacher: Nicole Kline

School: Lemoyne Elementary School

Inclusive Teaching with a Montessori Mind frame is a project with an aim to improve the teaching environment in three different classrooms. The Montessori philosophy incorporates many elements of students' choice. We would like to purchase materials that reflect the diversity of our classrooms. The inclusion of these materials to the array of work that students may choose from will enable us to fulfill our vision. Our vision is to have a cultural work area in each of our classrooms that reflects students of differing physical abilities, cultures, and languages. All of our students from the ones born with chronic medical conditions to the ones who do not speak English should see a classroom that reflects them and everything about that makes them special.

Personalized Learning Through the Arts

Teacher: Mary Juman


School: Ed Smith K-8 School

Personalized Learning Through the Arts provides instruments and equipment that will be used to create learning stations in our Middle School Music Rooms. Each room was previously equipped with 7 keyboards and some drums; however this grant allows us to create a guitar and a listening station as well. It also provides 9 new drums to round out our drum centers. Student will use these stations to meet Common Core Fine Arts Standards including Creating, Performing, Responding, and Connecting to music. Because the keyboard and listening stations use headphones there can always be a teacher led station as well. Students will have choice in what and how they want to meet the objectives on any given day. Finally, ALL students in Grades 6-8 will perform in a recital or concert during the school year.

Carrier Corporation STEM Grant

STEM & Agriculture Lab

Teacher: Jing Xu

School: Franklin Elementary School

This STEM and Agriculture Lab project provides unique hands-on experiences to all students at Franklin Elementary School to stimulate their interest in science. It intends to build long-term and ongoing opportunities for students to be successful applying concepts to life experiences. Farm Futures describes that agriculture aligns with STEM learning, whether it's the science behind farming itself, engineering and programming new technology to increase the efficiency of farming, or developing the mathematical concepts necessary to help engineer the new technology. It's clear that agriculture involves all aspects of STEM, making it necessary to "boost the lagging K-12 Ag education." A Gree research paper indicates that the U.S. economy will prosper with strong productivity gains in both the agricultural and industrial sectors with better trained professionals, and that work must begin in elementary and secondary schools. This will also include food-related as well as agriculture-related topics. Franklin Elementary school is an urban school, where very few students, if any, can experience the agriculture products growing cycle or how a farm works. The STEM and Agriculture Lab project is easy for teachers and students to use and helps to create a learning-friendly and productive school experience. The project provides hands-on science, technology, engineering and math (STEM) activities for elementary students to inspire their interest in science, which will build in all students lifelong skills, and lead to health and a well-being living style. The project engages students in aligning knowledge to life experience that creating a cooperative and supportive learning environment to enhance overall students' performance and success. Hands-on farming related tasks and assignments together with field trips and guest speakers from the farming community will be included in this project curriculum.

Process Portfolios in COLOR!

Teacher: Jeanette Capria-Lazzaro

School: Corcoran High School

Mrs. Capria-Lazzaro's Art students will be creating process journals throughout the year for the art projects that they develop and create. Using iPads and a color printer which they received from the Foundation grant, students will be able to record the stages of each project. They will print them to experiment with different art elements such different textures, colors, backgrounds, and problem-solve, trying many solutions. They will then finalize their art works after self-reflection and modification.

Mindfulness for Learning

Teacher: Crysten Rushmore

School: Frazer Pre-K-8 School

Teachers in two Frazer School first grade classes will receive training as children's yoga teachers so that the students can have formal yoga classes in their classroom but also incorporate the lessons throughout their day. The students will learn to focus their attention in a way that will improve their learning. The students will learn to be aware of their emotions and bodily sensations and what to do when they are struggling. The grant will provide a cool down corner in each classroom where students can take a break, use a breathing ball or their calming jar, read a mindfulness book, or listen to calming music. Their families will be invited to an event to see what the students have been learning, learn some yoga themselves, and take home some items to encourage practice at home, including a tool kit that each student will create for themselves with their personal most useful items. This will allow students to apply their learning at home and teach what they have learned to their families.

2019-2020 Grant Projects

The Knights of Lincoln

Teacher: Mark Dubey

School: Lincoln Middle School

The Knights of Lincoln is a citizenship project that will engage a core group of 15 at-risk students in book study and activities intended to decrease the occurrence of negative behaviors, while developing models for students to become upstanders (citizens who choose to do the right thing and influence others to do the same). During weekly meetings three Lincoln staff members will use the book, Rules for a Knight, as a basis for introducing students to a model of core beliefs that can be learned and practiced and expressed throughout the learning community. The project will integrate activities that include field trips for team-building and personal growth as well as community outreach events. The main goal of the project is to decrease the occurrence of negative behaviors in our most at-risk population by introducing, teaching, practicing and normalizing a model of core beliefs. These core beliefs are gleaned from letters purportedly written by Sir Thomas Lemuel Hawke to his children in 1483 prior to being killed in battle. The letters were later chronicled by his heirs and eventually published by Ethan Hawke in a book entitled Rules for A Knight in 2010. The secondary goal is to spread the ideas and beliefs of the writing by creating a group of upstanders (The Knights of Lincoln), students who model citizenship and foster interpersonal growth.

The Great Debaters

The Great Debaters project will involve middle and high school students from across the Syracuse City School District. The goal is to offer students an opportunity to participate in formal competitive debate, an opportunity that is not otherwise available to students in Central New York. The Educational Foundation grant will help to sustain this annual competition for the next three years.
